Academic Growth

KCIA has made a top-20 list for our academic growth during the 2021-2022 school year! A research organization from St. Louis University, SLU Prime, produces an annual report that ranks Missouri schools in terms of student growth. They use data from state tests and focus on the progress students make between two consecutive administrations, following DESE's official growth model calculations.

KCIA was recognized three times for the growth we made in the year following the Covid-19 pandemic. This report focuses on growth between the spring 2021 and spring 2022 state tests.

- 6th in statewide Mathematics growth for subgroup students.
- 9th in statewide Mathematics growth for all students.
- 18th in statewide English Language Arts growth for subgroup students.

*Subgroup: This is a state definition that tracks the growth of students from historically disadvantaged populations, which includes students who are Black or Hispanic; qualify for free or reduced-price lunch; or are English language learners or students with disabilities.






